Items of Interest

Preparing Vegetables to Exhibit at Fair

By this time, you know if your vegetable garden is flourishing, or, if you are like me, needs a little help. If you are one of the fortunate gardeners who are looking at a coming bounty, then you may want to exhibit your success with pride at the local Fair. I especially like the exhibits because in this rather challenging climate, one can see what is really possible.

Know your Fair rules. Look at the Fair Premium book to get familiar with local rules and regulations. It is always disappointing to come with your exhibit only to be disqualified because you didn't follow procedures in the Fair book. Entering items correctly and entering the correct number of specimens for a particular exhibit are common oversights.

Know the qualities Fair judges look for in vegetable exhibits.

Uniformity – specimens should be alike in size, shape and color.

Condition and quality – vegetables should be edible and in prime condition

Typical of type for the variety in shape, color and size *Specimens that are typical* of that vegetable found in the store – no monster zucchinis!

Cleanliness – wipe soft-skinned vegetables with a damp cloth. Wash or lightly brush soil from root crops *Arrangement* – carefully place specimens to show their most attractive and desirable characteristics

Know how to prepare different vegetables for exhibit. I recommend the Oregon 4-H Horticulture Contest Guide

for Vegetables, Publication 4-H 2334 found on the web at http://extension.oregonstate.edu/catalog/4h/4-h2334.pdf.

Learn the best ways to transport vegetables to the

Fair. Handle vegetables carefully. Avoid bruising and prolonged exposure to sun or heat. Wrap individual fruits in paper and place in a strong container. Take extra specimens along as replacements.

Preparing Flowers to Exhibit at Fair

In our last article, we described how you can prepare vegetable to enter in the Fair. This week, we will tell you how to prepare those beautiful flowers so they have the best chance at that coveted blue ribbon.

Cut around 4 p.m. the previous day, since that time is when the greatest amount of sugar is in the leaves. Place the stem in 100-110 degrees F water and move to a cool location for 15 to 20 minutes. Then refrigerate at 35 to 40 degrees F until put on display. Flowers with woody stems should be split crushed or pounded before being placed in deep water.

Know when to pick flowers.

Spike-form flowers (i.e., gladiolus) should be picked when the bottom florets are open and in good condition and has two-thirds of the blossoms open and one-third developing buds. The spike should be straight and the stem should be sturdy.

Round-form flowers (i.e., mums) should be cut when fully developed and the outer petals fold out gracefully. The center petals should be tighter than the outer petals, but not so immature as to be green.

Know your Fair rules. A close look at the Fair Premium book will tell you that they require a certain number of stems, sprays and arrangements. A stem is just what you might think: a single flower on one stem. A spray is a single main stem with blooms on the side branches. An arrangement uses many different types of flowers, usually to address a theme. Be sure to consult your Fair premium book for specific requirements.

Garden Hints

August checklist in the garden

 $\sqrt{\rm Replace}$ some of those tired summer annuals with fall annuals.

 $\sqrt{\text{Start planning changes to perennial beds.}}$

 $\sqrt{\text{During the cooler days of the month, divide and transplant older or bigger perennials.}}$

 $\sqrt{\text{Move spring bulbs or plant them in a different pattern.}}$ (Don't forget to add phosphorus when transplanting.)

 $\sqrt{\text{Prune summer blooming shrubs after they have finished flowering. Remove any dead or diseased branches.}$

 $\sqrt{\text{Start your fall vegetables.}}$ (Plant starts or seeds of green onions, beets, lettuce, spinach, radishes, and garlic.)

 $\sqrt{\text{Keep}}$ the weeds pulled, before they have a chance to flower and go to seed.

 $\sqrt{}$ Let some of the heirloom plants seed out and get ready to collect them Decide how you will label and store them for next year.

 $\sqrt{\text{Now}}$ is the time to attack weeds in your lawn so that by late August you will be ready to re-seed those now bare patches and over seed any thin areas.

Easy germination chamber

After you have planted seeds in a flat, place an empty flat--one with the geometric plastic grid, which allows light in--upside down over the planted flat. Cut a piece of plastic 3 feet wide by about 3 1/2 feet long. Place the flat on the plastic, pull the plastic up and around the flats, and secure with clothespins both on top and on the sides. Place in a warm place and wait for the little seeds to sprout. The upside down flat keeps the plastic from touching the soil and tender seedlings. It's also easy to open up to add water or to check to see if germination is happening.
