

We also have an extra "Nelson Rain Train" that we bought last year for \$55. It has never been used because the water pressure @ the office will not support 2 of these sprinklers running @ the same time. Anyone who wants to make an offer on it can call Penny Barton or the extension office. Penny has made a new tall sprinkler for the "Learning Garden". Please remember to turn it on along with the soaker hoses, when you come in for Plant Clinic & turn them off when you leave. It is our responsibility to water all the plants we have planted around the office. Also, 2 hours of your volunteer time need to be dedicated to working in the gardens at the office so let's keep it looking great!

**From Bob:**

I've gotten a couple of calls lately about volunteer hours and what is required. Since there was a change this summer, there is still some uncertainty about what the rules are. In order to assist Ann Keiser with the Learning Garden, the Board voted to require that 2 hours of your Community Service be completed in the Extension Office Landscaping. This does not include Plant Clinic hours that you spend watering plants which still should be recorded as Plant Clinic. In addition, some notes in the newsletter were in conflict with each other. The most important requirement is that you complete a **total of 18 hours** by mid- October which is when we tally hours for the year.

The current breakdown is:

Plant Clinic	9 hours
Community Service	4 hours (2 in the Extension Office Landscape)
Education	3 hours
Unspecified	2 hours
